Chuck's Chat — March 22, 2017

Sunday's gospel lesson was "the woman at the well" (John 4:5-30). I talked of the well of living water (Jesus) as being able to be found within St. Luke's. That was certainly the case for me personally at both services. God's Holy Spirit was in the building in strength, helping us to worship. And Jesus the Living Water was pouring out that Living Water in full measure. The way in which the visual element of water, the gorgeous music, the scriptures read with beauty and conviction, and the messages (children's and main sermon) all wove together kept my heart lifted up.

I truly believe that if you missed worship on Sunday, you missed a great blessing. It is a measure of just how much God loves us that, although our worship is intended to please God, God allows it to please and feed us as well.

And it's good to think about that fairly often: Just who is the "audience" at a worship service? The simple answer is "God." The church gathers, brings together our offerings – in the forms of music, dance, singing, speaking the scriptures aloud, preaching, preparing audio and visual media, prayer, and gifts of money or substance – and lays all these offerings out before God, to say, "We love you! You are worthy of all our praise, honor and loyalty. We confess how we have let you down, promise to follow you more closely, and seek your blessing to help us make it so."

There is a secondary audience: Those persons who aren't yet Christian, and visitors who may wonder how faithful people worship God. It may be a mistake to ask, "What can we do to please people?" But it is never a mistake to ask, "Are we worshipping in such a way that people will want to know our God better?" In fact, three questions might well guide us as we design worship: "What will most please God?", "What will most make people hungry to know God better?" and, "How can we best feed that hunger in a nourishing way?"

Notice that I *did not* include the congregation as part of the audience. The congregation is just as much part of the action as are the choir, praise team, readers, or preacher. And this isn't only true when the folks in the pews are speaking or singing. We participate just as much by our thoughtful attention to the sermon and by our prayers as we do when we sing a hymn. Imagine, for example, the different effect two members might have on a visitor during the sermon. One is fidgeting, counting the cracks in the ceiling, or playing Tetris on their cell phone, while another is taking notes, looking up the scripture references in their bible, and nodding their head, or even occasionally saying, "That's right," or "Amen."

Don't even consider which one is actually getting more out of the message! Just imagine the different impression each has upon a visitor. Now, think about the other parts of the service: singing the hymns, saying the prayers or the creed, or joining in the offering. Not only do we show God how important God is to us as we worship, we also show it to the person next to us.

Friends, I invite you to come to worship as though you were coming out to sit at Jacob's well. Not only do I invite you to draw up the Living Water of Jesus for yourself, but also to share with others.



Green Thoughts

Plastic bags never break down. Petroleum-based plastic bags do not truly degrade. What does occur is that when out in the environment, the plastic breaks up into tiny little pieces that end up in the ocean to be consumed by wildlife. Today, there are an estimated 46,000-1,000,000 plastic fragments floating within every square mile of our world's oceans.

Plastic bags and their associated plastic pieces are often mistaken for food by animals, birds, and marine life like fish and sea turtles. The consumed plastic then congests the digestive tracts of these animals, and can lead to health issues such as infections and even death by suffocation. Social Principles: The Natural World

(Part of a series from the 2016 edition of *The Book of Resolutions*, which contains the text of all resolutions or pronouncements on issues approved by the General Conference currently in force. These documents represent the official position of the UMC.)



1. Water, Air, Soil, Minerals, Plants

We support and encourage social policies that serve to reduce and control the creation of industrial by-products and waste; facilitate the safe processing and disposal of toxic and nuclear waste and move toward the elimination of both; encourage reduction of municipal waste; provide for appropriate recycling and disposal of municipal waste; and assist the cleanup of polluted air, water, and soil. We call for the preservation of old-growth forests and other irreplaceable natural treasures, as well as preservation of endangered plant species. We support measures designed to maintain and restore natural ecosystems. We support policies that develop alternatives to chemicals used for growing, processing, and preserving food, and we strongly urge adequate research into their effects upon God's creation prior to utilization. We urge development of international agreements concerning equitable utilization of the world's resources for human benefit so long as the integrity of the earth is maintained. We are deeply concerned about the privatization of water resources, the bottling of water to be sold as a commodity for profit, and the resources that go into packaging bottled water. We urge all municipalities and other governmental organizations to develop processes for determining sustainability of water resources and to determine the environmental, economic and social consequences of privatization of water resources prior to the licensing and approval thereof.
